## **INGL 3071 – Fall 2017 (LPM 214b)**

**Course Description:** INGL 3071 is designed for students who have achieved a high-intermediate level of communicative proficiency in listening, reading, speaking, and writing. This course combines content language learning with interactive tasks. To enroll in this course, students must have taken INGL 3004/3102, have scored at level four on the Placement Exam; or INGL 3052.

**Objectives:** Students will engage in activities that require the production and understanding of language in context. Activities include functions such as paraphrasing, explaining, describing, narrating, asking and answering questions, using contractions, giving commands, and summarizing. They will complete tasks such as asking for information, negotiating, describing feelings and locations, sequencing events in a narration, listening for important details, initiating, guiding, and finishing conversations, among others. They should work with advanced grammatical structures such as complex verbs, passive sentences and the past perfect; should read at a high-intermediate, and advanced levels; and write short compositions. Additionally, students will learn about traveling and culture.

- **1. Exams & Compositions:** There will be <u>two</u> chapter tests and a final. Be sure to schedule your appointments so that they do not conflict with course examinations. If you miss a test without a valid written excuse, then your total average will reflect a missing score. Compositions will be written in class on topics assigned the day indicated in the schedule.
- 2. Attendance & Participation: A significant percentage of your grade depends on your daily participation in class (40%). You will be evaluated on your effort to use English in class, for completing your work on time, writing short in-class compositions, and on the quality of your response. Skipping classes, leaving early, or failure to hand in assignments will lower your participation grade as well as your final grade. Every three late arrivals equal an absence. You must turn off your cell phone during class time. Lab: Beginning the second week of classes, you must attend the language lab twice weekly. Homework: You must prepare the assigned readings and exercises before class, so that class time can be spent interacting and communicating in English. If you do this before coming to class, and follow the syllabus, your acquisition of English will improve. I might give a pop quiz on the material assigned for the day. All work is due on the day assigned. Failure to turn in work on time will result in a zero.
- **NEED HELP?** I will be happy to help you during office hours with anything related to the course material. During class time, it's up to you to let me know if you do not understand. Learn a couple of helpful expressions: *I would like to know why..., I just did not catch that phrase/word.
