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Description:

In this course, we will read representative comedies and tragedies by Shakespeare, and we will see various film adaptations of the same dramatic works. Much time will be given to classroom discussion, analyzing how the directors and actors adapt their art to Shakespeare's poetic craft.

Course Objectives:

By the end of the course, students will:

- 1. Have read and understood many of Shakespeare's representative comedies and tragedies.
- 2. Have seen various film adaptations of these dramatic works.
- 3. Be able to analyze and critically examine these adaptations of Shakespeare's works.
- 4. Be able to write answers to essay questions and essays on these Shakespearean.

Electronic Resources and Materials:

After seeing the assigned films in class, you may want to see some of them again. Many of the films are available for personal viewing in the Department of English computer lab.

Teaching Strategies:

My teaching strategies include close reading and critical analysis of Shakespeare's plays and Shakespeare on film. This approach, of course, is only possible if students read all of the material for every class.

Methods of Evaluation:

- -- Examinations: Midterm Examination & Final Examination (40% each = 80%).
- -- Short papers (20%).

Requirements to obtain a Passing Grade:

To pass the class (with a grade of *D* or higher), students <u>must</u> take both the **MIDTERM** & **FINAL EXAMINATIONS**, as well as complete all of the written assignments (i.e., **short essays**).

Students <u>must</u> also **read all of the assigned works** in *The Norton Shakespeare*.

- **FAILURE** to meet **all of these requirements** will result in a **low** or **failing grade** (i.e., \underline{D} or F).
