II – Course Description:

INGL 3041 is a course designed to develop the vocabulary, idioms, pronunciation, and grammatical structures needed for daily conversation and written communication in students with low/intermediate English proficiency.

III - Course Objectives:

Upon completing the course, it is expected that the student will be able to:

- reduce their fear of speaking English;
- reflect on their attitudes towards learning another language;
- improve their listening comprehension in daily communication;
- become aware of common pronunciation problems;
- discern between basic verb tenses (simple and continuous present, past and future);
- recognize and use common idiomatic phrases in conversation;
- communicate effectively with others while working in groups.

IV - Course Requirements:

In order to succeed in this course, students must:

- have an active email account;
- attend class and be punctual;
- actively participate in class;
- hand in assignments when due;
- bring whatever materials are required for each session;

This class follows a communicative approach, based on activities that stress interaction and active participation from students. These activities include, but are not limited to:

- working in small groups on problem-solving tasks or games;

- debates:
- class presentations;
- watching and discussing videos and movies;
- listening to and completing song lyrics;
- games;
- talking informally on a wide range of topics with partners or in groups;
- written exercises;
- writing paragraphs to be handed in as assignments.

IX - Class Policies:
