## **Required Texts:**

*Norton Anthology of American Literature*. Package 1, Volumes A& B, 8<sup>th</sup> Edition. Ed. Nina Baym. (NOTE: you can also use the 7<sup>th</sup> or 9<sup>th</sup> edition but do NOT purchase the "shorter edition.")

Objectives: English 3251 offers a survey of American literature from its beginnings up to 1865 through analysis of a variety of texts: essays, poems, fiction.

Attendance: You will be allowed 5 absences without repercussions. Each absence over the 5 costs you 1/3 of a letter grade. I do not differentiate between excused and unexcused absences, so use your 5 wisely. Keep in mind that you are still responsible for the work on days you miss.

Graded Work: <u>Participation</u>: Class time will be devoted to DISCUSSION, not just lecture, which means you must participate. Participation comprises 5% of your grade.

<u>Quizzes</u>: Frequently, I will quiz you on the material we are reading. I will ask 5 or so multiple choice or short answer questions, which should be relatively easy to answer if you have done the reading. The combined grade for the quizzes will count for 20% of your grade. If you know in advance that you will miss a day, let me know and if there is a quiz on that day, I will provide a make-up assignment. Be aware that to do well on the quizzes you MUST READ. The entire course is designed to introduce you to a variety of texts. If you do not read these texts, you will not gain much from the course, nor will your grade likely bring you much happiness.

<u>Exams</u>: There will be 3 exams (dates on schedule). Exams will consist of short answer and a choice of essay questions. Each will be worth 25% of your final grade. Quality exams will demonstrate critical thought, not just memorization.
