COURSE OBJECTIVES:

In this class, we will read the poetry, prose, and criticism of Samuel Johnson, who was the most influential writer in Britain during the second half of the eighteenth century. Special attention will be given to his thoughts on language and the imagination, especially concerning poetic metaphor. To this end, we will examine works that are sometimes ignored in Johnsonian studies, particularly Johnson's edition of Shakespeare (1765) and his renowned *Dictionary of the English Language* (1755, 1st edition; 1773, 4th edit.).

TEACHING STRATEGIES:

This class includes lecture, dialogue, and student presentations. At the beginning of the semester, students will be given due dates both for their final seminar paper (roughly 15-pages & the "Works Cited" list) and for their two required presentations (which will be short, typewritten essays to be read in class on assigned dates). Note: The **due dates** for a student's **two presentations** are **firm** and cannot be changed, except in cases of illness (or unforeseen emergencies).
